SOCIAL RECOVERY TASK FORCE (SRTF)

The Social Recovery Task Force was established on April 27, 2020 - June 30, 2021, by the Town of Cochrane Mayor and Council to support and enhance the well-being, safety and resilience of Cochrane residents through the COVID-19 pandemic.

The SRTF conducted surveys to understand the needs of the community and assist with developing a coordinated response. We heard from 892 (22 organizations) respondents that:

Are concerned about finanical stability

7%

Need to move within the next 6 months due to finances 80%

Are concerned about their mental health and personal wellbeing

Do not feel a sense of belonging to our community

Reported an increase in family conflict




THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIPS TO ADDRESS FOOD SECURITY

COCHRANE AND AREA FOOD CONNECTIONS

A collaborative committee was formed to create an accessible, affordable and sustainable food system in Cochrane and neighbouring areas. The committee partnered with the University of Calgary Faculty of Nursing to create a food asset map, highlighting available food resources. Other initiatives included expanding food rescue and recovery programs and developing communication materials to help residents access food supports and education.

Testimonial: I am a single mom to a ten year old boy and we were struggling - to say the least. Upon making contact with the FRN, I was introduced to the Triple P program. The worker took me through the pyramid where I had several "light bulb" moments in the most unassuming and unexpected ways. Throughout the process - without even being conscious of it - my parenting style changed. At home I put those light bulb nuggets into practice and saw results. It seemed to work - my son was responding in a positive manner. I continued to try the very simple methods as I learned them and was rewarded with success - almost always. Which inspired me to continue to try the new approaches I was learning about. At the end of the pyramid our family had changed. We were happier and functioning in a much healthier way. I finally felt like I was actually a "good" mom and treating my son fairly and he was so much happier because of it. To say the program changed my life is a big statement and probably dramatic - but it did and has! It was the least painful change I think I have ever done and had one of the biggest impacts.

The Cochrane FRN is the HUB in the provincial funding model. The FRN works closely with the Children's Cottage Society and BGC Cochrane and Area to ensure families have the necessary support to thrive.

88% reported they learned of additional resources and supports available through programs.
























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
